Editorial Comment

Welcome to the second issue of Nynehead News in 2003.

Since the last issue of The Nynehead News we have seen one of the most memorable events in our community for quite some time. I refer of course to the Pantomime:

'Up the Beanstalk'

The very first production of the recently formed Nynehead Amateur Dramatic Society (NADS), shows just what can be done with many willing hands, much talent and creative and enthusiastic production and direction.

NADS was 'conceived' during the production of the epic 'Building Up Steam' of 2001 but has become much more important. 'Building Up Steam' was a 'one off' performance largely produced and directed by professionals. NADS is truly 'amateur' and draws upon the community for its skills, clearly demonstrating what can be achieved by those who wish to see their community thrive. I understand that plans are already underway for future productions and wish all concerned every success for many years to come.

The past couple of years have seen a number of changes to your team of Parish Councillors with only one member from four years ago remaining.

Parish Council elections are to be held throughout Taunton Deane on 1st May and if there are more eligible candidates than vacancies an election will be held in Nynehead.

If this happens you may find yourself being canvassed by the prospective candidates. This is your opportunity to decide whether they should 'get your vote'. Don't be afraid to ask what they think the important issues are and what they would do about them.

The Somerset Association of Local Councils (SALC) provides a wide range of training and with more and more responsibility being placed upon the shoulders of councillors it is important that they take full advantage of this facility

If a candidate is standing for re-election you may wish to ask what they actually achieved in their last term in office! Also, whether they attended and benefited from any of the available training.

The candidate you vote for will, if elected, be representing you – don't just vote out of habit or loyalty – try to elect the person you believe will be best for the job!

As you will read in the 'Beat News', congratulations are due to Jo Jeffery on her forthcoming 'happy event'. Whilst I am sure we all wish Jo well, I am very concerned that no replacement officer has been allocated to provide community cover in Jo's absence from beat duties.

As we pay for a police service, part of which is not going to be available, I wonder whether we should all consider applying for a reduction in rates?

Any thoughts on this or other matters affecting the community? If so, please write in. Unless offensive or completely inappropriate all correspondence received will be published!

So – let's have your views!

Nynehead Appraisal Group

The Appraisal Group continues to make progress and expects to distribute its detailed questionnaire to every household in the Parish of Nynehead early next month.

Just to re-cap, the objective of a Parish Appraisal is to establish what the residents of the Parish want and don't want - both now and in the future.

The Community Council funds the project with money sourced primarily from the National Lottery – it adds nothing to your or any other person's council or other taxes!

The questionnaires will be delivered by hand and collected – again by hand – about two weeks later. There is considerable emphasis on 'confidentiality'. You will place your completed form in a sealed unmarked envelope. On collection it will be added to a bag with other identical unmarked envelopes.

Neither the 'collectors' nor anyone else associated with this project will make any attempt to find out which form is yours – or anyone else's for that matter!

When the completed forms have been collected the answers will be analysed by computer. In June the Group expect to call a meeting at the Village Hall to present the results to the community. Details of that presentation will be given closer to the time.

Following the presentation of the analysis and bearing in mind your comments a Parish Plan will be produced and published later in the year.

This project will undoubtedly have considerable influence on the way Nynehead progresses in future years. Even if you are uncertain as to the benefits it is important that you complete the questionnaire. Only by doing so will you ensure that your views are taken into account along with all others.

Parish Council

The parish council has met as usual on the first Monday of each month. In January the annual precept was set – the parish element of the council tax. For the year starting on 1 April it will be £2000, £200 less than 2002-3!

Since Christmas the council has continued to push the highway authority to repair roads in the parish and to deal with the problem of flooding especially in east Nynhead and near the school. Some work has been done in Ash Lane but we understand that it is to be surface-dressed in the near future. They are taking a close look at the Hollow to deal with the problem of landslips and falling trees. We also expect some action on speed limits in the village.

Colin Spackman, our footpaths co-ordinator, has been working with Robin Darby on proposals for improving the public footpaths at the canal aqueduct over the Tone and by the pumping station near the school. It was agreed to contribute £500 from the Council's footpath budget to the cost of the work.

We hope that we have dealt with most of the government initiatives to 'improve' the working of parish councils although there are still one or two in the pipeline – a proposal for designating 'Quality Parish Councils' and a code of conduct for local government officers (including parish clerks). This should mean that the new council after the parish elections on 1 May will be able to concentrate on things, which really make a difference to life in Nynhead.

The Annual Parish Meeting, open to all electors of the parish, will be held in the Memorial Hall on Friday 16 May at 7.30 p.m. This is an opportunity to discuss matters of concern to people in the village and to hear what village organisations have been doing. As in the past it would help me for the purposes of writing the minutes of the meeting if I could have the reports from organisations in writing and ideally by e-mail to:

Hornshay Farm

Last year's continuous rainfall was very good for grass growing if not for much else! This meant that we had plenty of grass in the paddocks for grazing and also plenty of grass silage. The very wet autumn led to the late harvest of some of our maize. We were able to harvest the earlier varieties at the beginning of October, but the later fields weren't done until December. This late maize silage will be used as a 'buffer feed' in the summer months.

I ought to explain what a buffer feed is. It is a compliment to the grazed grass which is fed at milking time whilst the cows are waiting to be milked. Incidentally, the cows are not fed whilst they are being milked.

When we installed the new milking parlour four years ago we took out the old feeders. We have found that the cows are quieter - and the parlour stays cleaner!

The late harvest of the maize also delayed the drilling of the following crops of winter wheat which are normally drilled in October or November, but this year's was not put in until February. If we have a favourable Spring and Summer this should still give us a respectable yield.

There have been a couple of staff changes since I last wrote for Nynehead News. Andrew Kerton has left Courtfield School and is now working for us full time. He is also doing NVQ level 2 at Cannington College as part of a work based training programme. Rob Taylor (who used to live in Nynehead) decided that it was time for a career change and is now training to become a police constable for the Avon & Somerset Constabulary. Alan Taylor who was head herdsman for a very large herd just over the border in Devon has now joined us and is settling in very quickly.

The recent dry spell has enabled us to do some field work. All the grass fields have received their first application of fertiliser and we have been able to empty our slurry pit. This is spread onto the maize fields at the rate of about 7,500 gallons per acre so very little additional fertiliser is required. *Did you know that an acre of maize can produce four times as much oxygen as an acre of trees?*

Footpath Liaison Officer

One of the main activities for a Parish Footpath Liaison Officer is to provide an unofficial but, I hope, effective link between all groups and individuals concerned with the state and use of the footpaths within the parish.

To that end TDBC recently sent me a letter outlining their new approach to dealing with ploughing and cropping obstructions. Now although the Nynehead News is not a formal channel of communication, it seems a good place to give their policy a wider audience.

What follows is NOT the official policy, but a summary of it.

TDBC will take action on ploughing and cropping obstructions at a much earlier stage than in the past, using the powers available to them in sections 137A and 131 A of the Highways Act 1980 and the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000.

They will be particularly prompt in dealing with persistent offenders.

After verifying that any information received about an obstruction is true, they will send a letter to the occupier giving a time limit for restoration of the right of way. If at the end of the time limit the obstruction is still in place TDBC will take steps to remove the obstruction, probably by a contractor. They will then charge the costs to the occupier.

The time limits vary, but for ploughing it is 14 days from the time of first being cultivated, and 24 hours after subsequent cultivation, whereas for cropping it is 14 days from the date of the first letter.

When is a crop an obstruction? They say that as soon as it reaches a height of 100 mm (4 inches, give or take) then a crop is considered an obstruction.

The District Council hope that by tackling problems at an early stage there will be fewer complaints from the public, and the public's enjoyment will not be compromised.

Ornithology News.

By the time parishioners read this it will be a few weeks into the Spring. In the BIRD world Spring is probably epitomised by the return of the cuckoo. Much to my surprise I have learned recently that the numbers of returning cuckoos is decreasing in the UK and thus also in Somerset. I am surprised at this for one simple reason, namely that in the six years that I have been fortunate to live in Nynehead the return of the cuckoo has been very consistent. I have logged the first call between April 14th & 16th every year! Whether this is the same bird returning I do not know, but what I do know is that, according to the records of the Somerset Ornithological Society, Nynehead usually has the earliest or one of the earliest arrivals. Cuckoos are large birds, about the size of a rook. People do not realise this because they are very hard to see. They are secretive and very good at hiding even when they are making their loud call. The closest you are likely to get to them is a distance of 150-200m unless you are very lucky so you will only appreciate what a striking bird a cuckoo is if you have binoculars handy! They like perching on telegraph wires and I see 'my' cuckoo most often on the wires which cross the set aside field near to the Playing Field. By early June the adult birds are already making their way back across the channel so only the younger and therefore silent birds remain. It really is a short season for those of us keen to see or hear a cuckoo.

Thankfully, this is not the case with many of our other visitors. By now many readers will have seen their first swallows and house martins of the summer and swifts will be here in May. If you know what to listen for, lots of villagers will have heard the chiffchaff which calls its name "chiff chaff" repeatedly from a low tree or bush! If you walk along the lane towards Milverton from Higher Nynehead you will also be able to see the first common whitethroats in the hedges or on the wires. In June, look out for one of the most exotic visitors – the spotted flycatcher. It does exactly what it says, it catches flies and really does look very unlike the birds we are normally used to. They are not common at all but here in Nynehead we are well blessed with them. Last year a pair bred at the Strawberry Farm right beside one of the main paths, there were at least 4 pairs in the garden of Nynehead Court,

one pair in the churchyard and another in a porch to near the primary school!

I will finish by returning to winter! Last time the Village News carried an article about fieldfares. These striking winter visitors were much more scarce than usual this winter but arrived right at the end in good numbers. I counted more than 200 on the field between Blackdown View and the strawberry farm every day throughout February and into March. There were redwings, starlings and wood pigeons with them too.

News from Nynehead School

The school continues to be a very busy and happy place.

Taunton Deane has now published the children's **tree trails for Nynehead Court**, which the children designed and wrote last Spring. There is one for adults and older children, and one for children aged 6 or under. The trails are available in public libraries and other outlets locally. Why not go along to the grounds of Nynehead Court on a Wednesday or Sunday between April and October and enjoy the magnificent trees there!

The school was awarded **Investors in People** status in December in recognition of the commitment to training and developing the skills of all staff who work in school. The plaque is to be unveiled by Mervyn Hooper, Chair of the Parish Council and former Chair of the Friends of Nynehead School (FONS), at the school's Easter Fair on Thursday 10th April.

All of the children of the school learnt the songs for the village pantomime, *Up the Beanstalk*, and many were present for the performances. Congratulations to everyone involved for a most enjoyable and impressive entertainment!

The Junior children are about to work with the Actiontrack performance company on a joint play with five other local schools. At the time of writing the exact title is not known, though it will be to do with traditional stories of the area. The performance will be outside at the **Wellington Monument at 4 pm on Friday 9th May** (or in Saint Johns church, Wellington if it's very wet). Many in the village will remember Actiontrack for co-ordinating and directing the wonderful *Building Up Steam* community play at Nynehead Court two years ago.

All the children of the school have been working with designer Avril Silk to create a beautiful stained glass window to go in the ICT suite of the school. This will be installed in the Summer term and formally unveiled at the school's Summer Fete and Strawberry Cream Tea afternoon, probably in June. Do keep your eyes open for the exact date which will be set early in the Summer term!

After six years and a term Headteacher Peter Pearson will be moving on to other work at the end of the Summer term. Parents should know by the end of the Spring term who will be appointed as the locum Headteacher for September. Although Peter's new work with the London Leadership Centre will involve a lot of travelling he will still live locally and he is looking forward to hearing of the future projects and successes of the school in the years ahead!

Finally, the staff and Governors of the school remain committed to having close links with the local community. Please do use the opportunity provided by the forthcoming Village Appraisal to suggest ways the school and community can work together even closer in the future.

With the sun shining and the stretch in the evenings many of us will be venturing out into the garden to start a bit of spring tidying. Please bear in mind that there is a market for stolen lawn mowers, hedge trimmers, strimmers, chain saws and any other power tool or piece of garden machinery which you may store in your shed. Do not abandon your equipment on the lawn to go out to collect the children from school. It only takes a second for an opportunist thief to lift it. A similar incident happened recently in the grounds of Milverton Court where a petrol hedge trimmer was stolen when briefly left unattended. Likewise, while working in the garden do not leave your house insecure. Only last summer a Milverton couple were burgled while they were both in the garden. Please don't let it happen to you, lock your doors and close your windows.

Bogus Callers

Information has been flooding in recently about travelling salesmen from Holland/Germany in our area. They have been driving foreign registered 4x4 motor vehicles and selling stainless steel goods, and sets of chefs knives.
