Church Services:

1st Sunday in the month in Nynehead Court at 10-30am

 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} and 4^{th} Sundays in Church at 10-45am

On the first Sunday in the month the church service is held in Nynehead Court at 10-30am when the usual church congregation share the service with the residents of the Court and the service is followed by coffee. This is a short service of morning prayer with hymns and is open to anyone to attend.

On all other Sundays the service is held in church at 10-45am with the exception of the 5th Sunday when there is a Joint Team Service held at one of the churches in the team. These services are Parish Communion services, however, one does not need to be confirmed as the majority of the service is relevant to everyone.

A Communion Service is held in Nynehead Court on a weekday, usually on a monthly basis

Since writing the church contribution for the last Newsletter, the Village Church has been extremely active and has welcomed a large number of visitors both to church services and the church.

At the end of August *The Somerset Guild of Craftsman* held their *summer exhibition* in the church, which proved to be extremely successful. The church proved to be an ideal place as the many church artefacts fitted in well with the excellent craftwork on display. The exhibition may become an annual event and if anyone didn't visit it this year we would recommend that you do visit it next time as it is well worth seeing the quality of items produced by the craftsmen.

Also during the exhibition we had a visit of the Clevedon Archaeological Society when over 20 members had a guided tour of the church, Nynehead Court and the canal.

The Craftsman exhibition was then closely followed 2 days later by the *Heritage Weekend*, which meant a rapid clear up in readiness for the many visitors who attend on these occasions. This year we must have seen more than 100 visitors over the two days, which kept us extremely busy but it is good that so many people want to see our wonderful building and artefacts. If you are new to the village and would like to have a guided tour please do contact Tony Lock on 461214.

At the end of September we had the *quinquennial church inspection*. This happens every 5 years when an architect makes a detailed survey of the building and makes recommendations as to the work which needs to be carried out in order to preserve our heritage. Although at the time of writing we have not yet received his report, we hope that there will not be too much urgent work required.

This year our *Harvest Service* was held on the evening of September 30th because in the morning there was a group service at West Buckland being a fifth Sunday in the month. The Harvest Service was a Songs of Praise and was quite well attended. On the Monday all the Harvest Gifts were then delivered to the Taunton Womens Refuge and they were extremely grateful for the gifts.

On October 6th we held the *Harvest Supper* in the village hall and this was once more well supported and very much enjoyed by all. We thank all those who organised the event and contributed to the supper.

On the 14th October we welcomed the Archdeacon of Taunton who took our morning service.

On the 17th October members of our congregation took part in a demonstration in Wellington in support of the "Stand Up and

Speak Out Against World Poverty" which is an international campaign. The demonstration was organised by a new ecumenical group set up by a group of Christians from the churches in the area from both the Wellington Team and other denominations. The title of the group is Christian Care for One World (CCOW).

On the 20th October the *Taunton Deane Male Voice Choir* gave an excellent concert in the church which was very much enjoyed by all those who attended. Unfortunately it was the same night as the Rugby World Cup final, so attendance was slightly down but however it was a very successful concert.

On 1st November we held our Patronal Festival Service and this was combined with the first Thursday of the month meeting of all the 5 churches in the group.

Church Fabric:

The Bee Bowls on the wall between the church and the Court have reached a state of collapse and work is being carried out in order to restore them.

Work is also being carried out on the Bell Openings as the Ham Stone is beginning to split.

Unfortunately in mid October broken glass from the Armorial window was discovered on the window sill and it is thought that the 16th century window had been hit by a bird. Hopefully the window will be restored to its full glory again by the time this newsletter is published.

It is hoped that the bells will be returned to the church in the near future prior to them being re-hung in the tower.

There has been a great deal of concern expressed recently about the stealing of metal from buildings such as churches and we would be grateful if everyone in the village will keep an eye on any suspicious vehicles around the village and report them to the Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators or the police.

Nynehead Under 5's

September was the start of only the third year of the Pre-School and in this time we have created a thriving, village Pre-School. Our register has grown from 4 children to over 26 children, we have a waiting list for this year and a number of children registered for September 2008. Most of our success is due to our fantastically hard working staff and our extremely supportive Committee.



We are fortunate that our Pre-School is surrounded by wonderful countryside and Dawn, our Pre-School Leader, and her staff have made the most of this. Children have been on many nature walks and have often returned home clutching a bag of blackberries for their parents. This term we will also be joined by childcare professionals who will work with the Pre-School to run some sessions of Forest School. This is an approach pioneered by Bridgwater College which aims to nurture, support and develop the self-esteem of children through outdoor activities.

We are always looking for staff to work at our Pre-School either on a permanent or supply basis. Our staff have a range of qualifications and experience such as NVQ Level 3 in Childcare but we can provide training to those who are enthusiastic about working with children aged between 2 and 5 years old. We also have a number of opportunities for people who wish to volunteer at our Pre-School. If you are

One of the biggest threats to the future of our Pre-School is the size of our Committee. We need new volunteers who can help us to continue to develop what is a fantastic resource for the village. Our Committee is made up of volunteers who are interested in the Pre-School and without their support there would be no Pre-School. Our current Committee has achieved fantastic results this year. Running the Pre-School is essential like running a small business including paying wages, recruiting and supporting staff, managing registrations, purchasing equipment and setting and keeping to budgets. As well as all this, this year we have secured grants of over £50,000 and held several successful fundraising events, including our Ladies Indulgence Evening which raised over £250. Footpaths

SCC Handbook and Toolkit

Up to now, the extent of a Footpath Liaison Officer's role has been informally agreed between the Parish Council and the volunteer. But now the County Council has produced a formal handbook to guide all concerned with footpath monitoring and maintenance. The role is now known as PPLO - Parish Path Liaison Officer. The glossy handbook, which has no page numbers, runs to about forty A4 pages and contains, among others, sections entitled PPLO's Role & Code of Conduct. Common RoW I ssues, Reporting a Fault or Problem, Health & Safety and Risk Assessment. A map and list of rights of way in the parish are also included, but they needed to be corrected in a number of respects.

The Handbook was launched at a meeting in Taunton at which all PPLOs present were also issued with a toolkit, on loan from the County Council. The toolkit includes a pair of secateurs, a high visibility vest, a pair of loppers, a small retractable handsaw and a pair of leather gloves. Both the handbook and toolkit are in my possession, but if anyone wants to see them just let me know (01823 666702).

Autumn Activity.

Unfortunately, due to a variety of reasons, I have not been out on the paths much this autumn. As usual some paths are easier to use than others but a few new difficulties have been reported - a locked farm gate in East Nynehead, a blocked Bristol gate on the path by Dunelm, a broken finger post in Ash Lane and some fallen trees in Long Copse.

I mplementation of the Denis Dodd's Permissive Path from the canal lift to the carriage drive and back under the canal has been well received by walkers and is a welcome addition to Nynehead's footpath network.

Parish Council

Parish council business has been dominated over the last few months by the proposal to replace the temporary classroom and offices at the school with a permanent timber building. The council is keen to support measures to maintain the contribution of the school to the local community. However along with the immediate neighbours it did not consider that the traffic and parking implications of the scheme had been taken into account and did not agree with the removal of trees. Following the offer of land for a car park and in response to the objections the planning applications were withdrawn. A revised scheme is being prepared and a new application is expected before Christmas.

When the parish council reconvened after its summer break there was some good news – Nynehead had been successful yet again in the Village of the Year competition, winning the 'People' category. Congratulations to Paul Netley and his team for successfully making Nynehead's case.

Continued pressure is being put on Somerset Highways to maintain roads in the parish to a good standard. This usually entails asking them to fill in potholes and deal with the edges of roads were they are breaking up and it is good to report that there is often a quick response to the council's request. We feel that many of the problems arise from lorry traffic which should not be going through the village, perhaps misled by 'satnav' equipment. In response to a County council survey we urged that all non-essential traffic should be directed away from the village.

The council continues to respond to planning applications. In most cases there is no objection but the council supported local objections to a new house in Blackdown View on the grounds that would be out of character with the neighbourhood. These objections were accepted by the Deane which refused permission. Revised plans were still not acceptable to local people but

in the event the Deane Council granted permission

In the summer the council's finances were given a clean bill of health by our external auditors. We are now reaching the time of year when we agree our budget and council tax requirements for the financial year beginning in April 2008. This will be one of the main items at our meeting on Monday 3 December in the Memorial Hall, starting at 7.30 p.m.

Birwatching - and Beyond!

Well, the summer visiting migrant birds have all flown South to warmer climes and so has Alastair Riley!

I know that his regular Birdwatching items in Nynehead News have always been a popular read and it is going to be a hard act to follow. Mike has asked me to continue the theme but as a less experienced birdwatcher than Alastair, this will take the form of a more general view of the natural history of the parish.

So far this autumn has seen the arrival of the Fieldfares. Small flocks of this noisy thrush, which travels to our islands from the cold of Scandanavia and Europe, are enjoying the fruits of the hawthorns and other berries around the village and they are often to be seen in the company of their smaller relatives, the blackbirds. Fieldfares are bigger and their plumage with its distinctive grey rump and head which makes them easy to recognise. They also have a very heavily spotted chest. It is likely that yet another member of the family, the slightly smaller Redwing, with its pale eye stripe and red under wing flash will also be seen with them too.

As the year draws to a close, many of our native residents begin to either wind down for their winter rest or gorge themselves to build up reserves for the colder months. Hedgehogs are quite numerous in Nynehead and whilst often visiting our gardens unseen in the hours of darkness, there is a chance that they may appear in daytime, especially if they are young, since food supplies have been sporadic this year. They feed on a wide range of garden creepy crawlies and are very beneficial as they consume many garden pests. However, they are becoming nationally scarce and are now on the UK endangered species list and so need all the help we can offer. If they do frequent your patch, there are a number of things to do which help. Firstly, please DO NOT feed them with bread and milk - this can cause digestive upsets which can weaken them. Far better

to offer cat or dog food or even he specially formulated hedgehog foods on the market. Secondly, they will be looking for a safe and cosy place to spend the winter. Bonfires and heaps of garden waste are frequently what they choose and this could result in many coming to a very unpleasant end, so please check before lighting or thrusting in a fork or spade. The alternative way to help is to provide a suitable hibernation box tucked in a quiet corner of the garden. These can be purchased ready made but are also very simple for a DIYer to make. There are a few design guidelines needed to create the perfect 'home' and details are to be found in wildlife books and on the internet (try http://www.fow.org.uk/hogboxfow.htm for example). Only the other day, I heard a rustling noise in my garage and found a hedgehog trying to tuck down under some dust sheets in a corner. He seemed happy to be relocated to a log pile outside and which had been created for such events - maybe he hadn't been able to read the 'To Let' sign! If you do need to move them, careful handling with gloved hands is simple and don't worry about their fleas - these are 'host specific' and will not decide to live on you or in your home. Equally, their 'visitors' will not transfer their affections to cats and dogs.

The warmer climate we are experiencing in the UK is having an affect on our wildlife. Consequently, many hitherto vulnerable species of insects are now surviving through our winters. Butterflies, moths, ladybirds etc. need places to hibernate in the colder snaps and therefore we can help by ensuring that suitable nooks and crannies are available for them. There is one ladybird species however which is not welcome. The Harlequin Ladybird is a continental species that was introduced in 1988 to America in an effort to control pests (all ladybirds love to eat aphids) and now it has found its way to the UK. Unfortunately it also attacks and kills our native species - we have some 26 in the British I sles- and this is not good news. Although most records of Harlequins since 2004 were from south eastern England, they are spreading westwards and northwards and I recently found one in south west

Gloucestershire at Westonbirt Arboretum!
They can be difficult to positively identify because they can range from pale orange with many black spots to black with two red/orange spots or even have no spots at all!
One useful identifying feature is that they have brown legs – so get your magnifying glasses cleaned! If you do come across a suspect, please let me know and I might be able to help. Alternatively try visiting http://www.harlequin-survey.org/

on the internet where all manner of useful information can be found and you can also register your records and have them verified by experts.

Above all, Nynehead's wildlife is worth recording so if you spot something interesting, please do let me know.


