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### **Editorial Comment**

### Welcome to the July 2004 Edition of Nynehead News.

As always, the objective is to provide an information and communication service for all members of our community and act as a vehicle to enable Nynehead's residents to contribute their thoughts, experiences and ideas for the interest and benefit of all. The editors retain the discretionary right to reject material or comments considered to be directly or potentially inappropriate or offensive

When we started the current version of the Nynehead News in April 2002 we were fortunate to receive an offer to print our journal at no cost to ourselves – or indeed you, the readers.

Unfortunately this offer is not going to continue forever and we need to become self-sufficient. The cost of printing the required 160 copies required depends upon the number of pages, but is in the order of £80 to £100 – between 50p and 60p per copy! In addition many hours are taken up gathering copy, formatting the layout, producing proofs, proof reading and so on, which are not costed.

The team currently producing the newsletter have considered many possible options from charging for 'copy', requesting payment upon delivery, or trying to sell advertising space. After much discussion we are taking the latter route and hope you will all endeavour to help by buying space whenever you can. Lu Hawkins has offered to become our Advertising Editor and will actively sell space on our behalf.

We have also elected to change the distribution months from January, April, July and October to March, June, September and December to enable readers and advertisers to let the community know of their activities and special offers in the run up to Christmas and Easter. This means that the next issue will be this September so please note that the deadline for copy is the 30<sup>th</sup> August.

You will also notice that the front and back covers of this edition are printed in colour. We now have access to an inkjet printer that is capable of printing on A3 paper in colour. Whilst we are able to print the 160 sheets that form the cover ourselves it is hardly feasible to include the other 480 sheets required. Although these are being printed for us on this occasion we must look to the future.

The advertising charges we have agreed are shown opposite and bearing in mind that many people keep their copy of the Nynehead News until they receive the next edition, usually three months, it really is value for money. The service was well attended and several of the school children took part.

Heritage Weekend: The church will again be taking part in the Heritage weekend, which takes place on the weekend of September 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>. There will be conducted tours in which the history of the building and contents will be explained. The tours will take place between 10.30 am and 4 pm on the Saturday and 2.30 pm and 5 on the Sunday.

### Nynehead Parish Council

The last three months have seen the Annual Meeting of the Council in May, at which the chairman and vice-chairman are elected. Mervyn Hooper and Mike Briginshaw continue in these roles for this year.

The parish council must by law have an Annual Meeting, which should not be confused with the Annual Parish Meeting, also held in May. The APM is open to all electors in the parish but only eleven electors attended this year's APM compared with twenty-three in 2003. However the reports made by Nynehead's organisations were sufficiently positive for Louise Lewis of the Welly Weekly to put together a glowing full-page feature about the village. This was of course inevitable for our award-winning village!

Nynehead's success in 2003 means that the parish council has the pleasant task of deciding on the village's behalf how the substantial prize money should be spent. Having considered the several very worthwhile suggestions received the council is seeking further comment and ideas, which everyone is invited to submit using the form enclosed with the newsletter.

This apart, the council continues its month by month job of responding to planning applications (they are not happy with the proposal for a livestock market at Chelston), bringing road problems to the attention of the highway authority, keeping an eye on our village footpaths and generally promoting the interests of the village.

Unless we have an urgent matter to consider, such as a planning application, the council has a break in August. The next meeting will therefore be held in the Memorial Hall on Monday 6 September, following the usual public question time at 7.30 p.m. Before the meeting the Somerset Waste Action Programme will make a presentation about waste recycling, particularly relevant now that it has been announced that the Poole disposal site is to close shortly. Everyone is welcome to the presentation, which starts at 7 p.m.

### Nynehead and District Local History Society

We are now well into our summer programme of visits. On 11 June a select few of us travelled to Charmouth on the Dorset Heritage Coast to look for, and find fossils, on a wonderful warm evening. On 2 July we visit Isle Abbots church, one of the jewels of Somerset, while on Friday 23 July as part of National Archaeology Fortnight we are having a walk around East Nynehead looking at 2000 years of landscape history. We leave the Memorial Hall at 6 p.m.

Our fourth visit of the summer is on Wednesday 18 August when we go to the internationally famous 'bone cave' at Banwell, near Westonsuper–Mare. In addition to the cave there are follies and a garden. We leave the Memorial Hall travelling by car at 1.00 p.m. or meet at the caves (GR ST 382 588) at 2.00 p.m. There is no charge for entry but donations towards the cost of restoration etc would be appreciated. Cream teas are available at £3.50. Anyone interested should let me or Tony Lock know by 11 August.

Looking forward to the autumn, at 2.30 p.m. on 18 September the parish church is hosting a lecture by Dr. Mark Goldie of Churchill College Cambridge to commemorate the three hundredth anniversary of the death of the English philosopher John Locke, who had close links with Nynehead. Locke was of international importance, one of the two great minds of the late 17<sup>th</sup> century (the other being Isaac Newton), and we are fortunate that Nynehead has been chosen for this event which is being organised by the Somerset Archaeological and Natural History Society.

Our own autumn programme begins on Friday 8 October when John Burgess and David Canham will tell us about their Oral History project which seeks to record the memories of people who worked in local industry such as Relyon and Fox's. Thereafter we meet on the second Friday of each month at 7.45 p.m. in the Memorial Hall. All are welcome to our meetings and our annual subscription remains at £7.

### Nynehead Under 5s receives Sure Start Funding for new Pre-School



Nynehead Under 5s have been awarded over three and a half thousand pounds from the Sure Start to support the establishment of a new innovative Pre-School in Nynehead.

The Pre-school will initially offer 3 sessions per week 9.00 am – 1.00 pm Tuesdays, 12 – 4 pm on Thursday and Fridays during term time and specifically aims to offer sessions during the afternoon when other pre-schools are closed. The Pre-school staff will work closely with parents and will offer children a wide range of activities including waterplay, cooking, painting and model making. Nynehead Under 5s has a strong link with the local primary school which will provide it with considerable opportunities for joint activities, sharing equipment and experiences.

Parents in the village have been working hard to raise funds and have received grants from the Community Chest and Communities First in Rural Somerset. Over 50 families took part in a village Egg Hunt and further fundraising events are planned.

Members of the Nynehead Under 5s Committee were invited to a special meeting at County Hall to sign for the Sure Start funding which will support the new Pre-School in the village. Gill Davies, Treasurer of Nynehead Under 5s, said, "We are extremely pleased to have been awarded this funding and are very grateful for the support that Somerset County Council's Play and Early Years Service and the Pre-School Learning Alliance has given us in applying for this funding. Nynehead Pre-School is a real community venture and this funding will enable us to provide an exciting dynamic pre-school which will really enrich childrens' lives."

## BREAKING UP IS VERY HARD TO DO – why not give Relate a try; it's never too late to come to Relate


### Nynehead WI

### Nynehead Birdwatching!

Many thanks for the helpful comments and calls from villagers about birdlife in Nynehead over the Spring. Several callers mentioned hearing the cuckoo on April 18<sup>th</sup> and thereafter. In fact I recorded it first on the 17<sup>th</sup> – one day earlier than in 2003 but one day later than 1998-2002! Mind you....how many of us heard the cuckoo in Nynehead after mid-May I wonder? I fear that this bird may not have stayed on to breed and the decline in this species is quite marked. Throughout Somerset, though not including its stronghold on Exmoor, I have only heard 3 cuckoos this year.

Huge thanks to Nick Hollingsworth for his call about the first swallows in the village in mid-April. They were pretty tardy again this year - undoubtedly due to weather forces in France - but Mervyn Hooper saw the first one on April 5<sup>th</sup> which is not too bad. I had another couple of days to wait but ever since have been delighted to watch them low over the fields in the village swooping on insects. I wonder how many nests we have? Also, huge thanks to Alan Ketley who recorded Nynehead's rarest bird this year on April 16<sup>th</sup>. A male redstart, probably en route to Exmoor breeding grounds, stayed around his garden for a day or two. This is a delightful species which inhabits the canopies of broadleaved woodlands in southern England once it arrives here in Spring. They are difficult to see and I am told that there are far fewer in their favoured haunts than a year or two ago. The same is true of the spotted flycatcher but it's great to report that Nynehead still boasts a few of these exotic flying dancers. There is certainly one pair in the churchyard and another at Nynehead Court in addition to others which readers may know about! If you find them do let David Manners or I know, please.

By the time that this piece is printed and read most of the hectic breeding season will be past and the summer visitors will be moving south. With that, it is worth dwelling on the pleasures of the resident species of birds here in the village and I must say how delighted I have been this year to find two or three species using the mature hedgerow and extended field edge near Blackdown View for the first time. Green and Great Spotted woodpeckers have nested and there has also been a treecreeper and a bullfinch. A whitethroat sang from cover all spring and I hope it will return next year. Well done our locals - and I don't just mean the birds! Alastair Riley

### Footpath Liaison Officer

As many footpath users will have noticed, a couple of the more popular paths in the village have been affected by seasonal agricultural work. Some of this has been deliberate, some accidental. One path affected is that between the village hall and Blackdown View, the other being the path between the fruit farm and the top of Gypsy Lane.

In both of cases the headland path was, due to previous activity, less comfortable to walk on than the cultivated field. It seemed that the easiest way to improve the footpaths' surface was to plough and harrow, but not seed, them. Now as it is against the law to plough headland paths, the matter was discussed with TDBC and then agreed with the agricultural contractor before this approach was adopted.

Consequently the ploughing and harrowing took place as planned. So far so good. But then, unfortunately, the path was seeded because the tractor driver who drilled the fields was not aware of, or had forgotten, or just ignored the plan.

However when this mistake became apparent the contractor readily agreed to correct the situation, and by the time you read this the paths should be clear of crops, and more pleasant to use than before.

I felt it was worth detailing the sequence of events because it raises several points.

Firstly, discussion between those that work the land, the District Council and the Parish Council can be beneficial in maintaining rights of way.

Secondly mistakes would be less likely to happen if those doing the actual work were footpath users. Awareness by the person actually driving the vehicle of the paths' location, and the law affecting them would in many cases reduce the chance of errors. Thirdly, mistakes do happen, but these can be corrected in a timely manner if all concerned co-operate.

And lastly, as it is inadequate or incorrect communication that causes difficulties perhaps we should invest in a couple of movable placards that could be used to inform walkers when remedial work on a path is a planned activity.

### **Wyvern Waste Meeting**

I attended the Wyvern Waste public meeting held in the Village Hall on 11<sup>th</sup> June and was interested to hear that Poole Tip will be full and capped by this November, which was very good news.

However, and causing much concern to the local inhabitants, they are applying for planning permission from Somerset County Council to continue using the site for transit purposes for a further three years, erecting a building of approximately 30 x 7 meters, so that the household waste can be stored before being transferred into large articulated vehicles for conveyance to another landfill site as yet undecided.

It is the use of there large vehicles that is causing great concern to the local residents as they feel the access road is not of sufficient quality to carry such vehicles, and they already experience vibrations in their homes from the smaller vehicles.

I have told the residents that I will let them know as soon as we receive the planning application so that they can come along to the Parish Council meeting and voice their opinions and that we will pass on their views when dealing with the application.

The recycling site is in use for members of the public and will continue until at least 2011.
